

Thought for the Week

REFLECTION - 12th/13th OCTOBER, 2024

Today's gospel gives us a vivid scene of a rich man meeting Jesus. This man is effusive and interesting, asking about eternal life. He begins by saying to Jesus, "Good Master.." but Jesus doesn't allow this flattery and says that God alone is good. The man asks what he must do to inherit eternal life and gets the standard response, "keep the commandments.." which the rich man seems to have done according to the Law of the time. Jesus looks upon this man with love and desires that he become a disciple. Here is the big challenge from Jesus. If this rich man wants to be a disciple and to inherit eternal life, he must do as Jesus asks of him. "Go and sell everything you own and give the money to the poor: then, come follow me." The rich man is unable to respond to this challenge. The cost of

discipleship is huge: give away all you own, give to the poor and then you will have treasures stored up in heaven. As we discover in the gospel, this new treasure is not enough for the man of wealth. He just cannot let go of his material wealth. The price of discipleship is too much. He goes away, sad and disappointed, returning to the wealth that prevents him from being a disciple.

Turning to his disciples Jesus tells them how hard it is for those who are attached to their riches and wealth to enter the kingdom of God. This story is a challenge for all of us. We live in a society which places much value on having things, owning as much as we can afford. We are overwhelmed by the subtle effects of advertisements which tell us that our lives will be happier if we buy their products, particularly of the cosmetic, fragrant kind! Likewise with clothes. We know too how children and young people are impressed by slick advertising, placing parents and guardians in the unenviable position of having to almost give in to every request for the latest of all things.

As children in the 60's and 70's in the village where I grew up, all the children were taught the value of money. We got only what was affordable. We got special treats on birthdays and at Christmas time. After that we were satisfied with what we had - a lovely, adventurous childhood. We worked for our pocket money and when we had sufficient we were allowed to buy something of our own choosing. Because we were taught the gospels of Christ, went to Sunday mass and prayed as a family, certain values were instilled into us. We prayed the grace before and after meals to give gratitude to God for what we had. These values are eternal, wise and sensible. Out of gratitude for what we had, an awareness of helping others less fortunate grew in our hearts. John Ortberg said, "Gratitude is the ability to experience life as a gift. It frees us from the prison of self-preoccupation."

How true! We need to rediscover the gift of gratitude for each day's blessings. I think Jesus is challenging us to ensure that we have our priorities and values right. Do we try to focus on the "kingdom of heaven or eternal life with God?" What price are we willing to pay for such a gift? If we are attached to our belongings, to what we have and what we own, we may be blind to the promptings of God in our lives. We may block out his graces. Perhaps Jesus is saying to us, that while he doesn't condemn material things or wealth, happiness ultimately resides not in possessions and not in gold but in the soul where we allow God into our lives.

Seeing your Life through the Lens of the Gospel - 13th October 2024 28th Sunday of Ordinary Time

- 1) We often get satisfaction from the things we own, clothes, cars, homes, gadgets, or money. There would be something unnatural if we did not. But what happens to us when our possessions begin to 'own' us, when they take a hold us, when we become obsessed with them? Jesus seeks followers who have the freedom to let go of possessions in order to be a servant of others. In whom have you seen this freedom? When have you experienced it yourself?
- 2) Growth implies change. That change sometimes means letting go of something we have at this moment: job, status, home, security, or something else we value. There can be an apparent loss in letting go. Yet have you ever found that you gained more than you lost by having the freedom to let go of something to which you had previously clung?
- The disciples thought that Jesus was making impossible demands of people following him. He acknowledged that discipleship was impossible to us on our own efforts alone. How have you experienced the benefits of the help of others and of God when you were faced with difficulties in life?

Week: Go Down to the Potter's House

This is the word that came to Jeremiah from the Lord: "Go down to the potter's house, and there I will give you my message." So I went down to the potter's house, and I saw him working at the wheel... Then the word of the Lord came to me. He said, "Can I not do with you, Israel, as this potter does? Like clay in the hand of the potter, so are you in my hand, Israel."

These words from the Book of Jeremiah inspired Donagh O'Shea, a Dominican friar, a highly regarded retreat leader, an authority on the mediaeval mystics, and a potter. 30 years ago, he began a series of workshops (which continue to this day) combining meditative work with clay. The aim is to help overcome the effects of centuries of introspection and individualism and to discover in ourselves and in the Gospel a straightforward simplicity. Even if you never throw a pot, his book "Go Down to the Potter's House" has become a spiritual classic.
