REFLECTION - 2nd/3rd NOVEMBER 2024

Dramas like Eastenders, Coronation Street, Neighbours and Fair City, while intriguing with plots and sub plots, don't always present a clear portrayal of human love. All kinds of relationships are explored and we see people drift in and out of relationships. These dramas seek to reflect modern life in all its variations and complexities. Yet, there isn't one of them that I would look to for a definition of true, human love. True human love is "divine" in nature because it always places the other person's needs first. True love has a sacrificial nature to it: it is only truly meaningful to the extent that we are, literally, willing to lay down our lives for one another.

In today's Gospel we hear these words from Jesus: "You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind and with all your strength.... You shall love your neighbour as yourself. There is no commandment greater then these." These words found their perfection in the life of Jesus himself. He gave selflessly, caringly, wholeheartedly, always giving of himself, being the very presence of the "loving-kindness of the heart of our God". Jesus was given to humanity so that we could reach our God-given potential for love, truth, beauty and goodness, so that we could find our own "divinity". St, John of the Cross, the great Mystic, said, "At the end of our lives we will be judged on love." And we are talking about true, sacrificial love. The love which seeks only the good of others.

In his life Jesus searched out the lost, the wounded, the rejected, the sinner, the broken ones, those considered "useless". When Jesus knelt low to wash the feet of his disciples he preached a powerful sermon. Our service of one another will, at times, call us to stoop low, to literally get on our knees. Look at the daily tasks of parents and guardians who can be broken in their care for their children. Look at Charities who work with the homeless, the many people who go out in the night to deliver hot food to the poor on our streets. Look at the work of our Missionaries who give wholeheartedly of their lives for the enrichment and betterment of those with little in life. Jesus enabled each individual who sought his help to discover the best of their humanity and Godlikeness. "I find the best way to love someone is not to change them, but instead, help them reveal the greatest version of themselves. " (Dr. Steve Maraboli). Jesus always helped people find the best version of who they were meant to be by God.

The challenge for us today can be summed up in the beautiful prayer of Saint Teresa of Avila: "Christ has no body on earth but yours, no hands, no feet on earth but yours. Yours are the eyes through which he looks compassion on this world, the feet with which he walks to do good, the hands with which he blesses all the world." Can we respond to the Word of God given to us this day?
