And taking the child by the hand he said to her, 'Talitha, kum!' which means, 'Little girl, I tell you to get up.' The little girl got up at once and began to walk about, for she was twelve years old. At this they were overwhelmed with astonishment, and he ordered them strictly not to let anyone know about it, and told them to give her something to eat.
